



◀ On July 16, 1862, Ida B. Wells, an African American journalist, was born to parent who were slaves. After the Civil War, she wrote about the evils she saw, including the hanging of African Americans. Wells went on to **found** many anti-lynching societies and organizations for African American women.

The Confusing English Language

Don't be confused! The word *found* is also the past tense of the verb *to find*. *To find* means something completely different from the verb *to found*. *To find* is from a German word *finden*, which means "to come upon." You could say, "She found her shoe under her bed."
